SOUTH CAMPUS GREETINGS

In a recent chapel, I asked the students, "What do these mean?" I then proceeded to display various logos on the

screen. There were resounding answers across the gym, calling out, "McDonald's," "Target," "Mickey Mouse," and yes, it's the parents' fault, "Starbucks!" Even the littlest ones knew what each of these represented.

Then I asked, "What is it called when something stands for or represents another thing?" It is a symbol. We have symbols all around us telling us the meaning of something without even needing to use words.

I then asked the students to look around the gym and tell me if they saw any other symbols. They quickly caught on and pointed out the Chapel Hill Christian School triangle on our posters and their uniforms. I told them that this symbol is in front of them at home and school every day, and it is important for them to know what it means.



Do YOU know what our triangle means?

At the very center is the cross. The foundation of all we do at CHCS is the Truth of the Lord Jesus, found in God's Word. "What does the Bible say?" is the question most asked at school, as we model for and teach students a Biblical Worldview with the prayer that it transforms their hearts and minds!



FAMILY

Each leg of our triangle represents what helps build this foundation for our students. The bottom leg is the FAMILY. God directs parents to "bring them (their children) up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." This is why it is important for us to have families at CHCS in which the parents have the same heart for their children as we do. We need to be in agreement, based on the Word of God, to give our students a firm foundation on which to stand.

The left leg of our triangle is the CHURCH. Attending church is an important part of the teamwork. When parents are nurturing their children in the Lord, then church will reinforce what is being taught at home. This is why church attendance is part of our Parent Covenant. Something is speaking into our children's lives. When we don't intentionally guide what that something is, culture is waiting to swoop in and do the job for us—causing confusion. When home and church agree, children receive a strong, consistent message on which to build their lives.

The right leg of our triangle is CHRISTIAN SCHOOL. Families could send their students to any school, but when they choose a Christian School, they choose a place that should align with the home and church. This continues to build up the framework around a child's life, where every major part of their life points back to the center of the triangle - to the truth of Jesus and His Word! Just as our students were quick to know that a big yellow M stands for McDonald's, my prayer is that as they look down at the triangle on their uniform, with the cross in the center, they will remember that they are in a place every day that is building up a firm foundation in their lives, to help them stand!





As I reflect on my five years at Chapel Hill Christian School, I'm amazed to see the incredible transformation in our approach to education, largely driven by technological advancements. 

FAMILY MATTERS Media: Helpful or Harmful?

In my role at the South Campus, I spend most of my

time talking with students one-on-one. I have been both amazed and concerned at the number of conversations that have become centered on screen time and media. Whether it's video games, TV shows, or especially YouTube, our elementary students spend significant amounts of time engaging with some kind of media. And wow, can they tell me all about it! The detail in which even first graders can explain a video game or a show they've seen on YouTube is astounding.

I want to encourage and maybe even admonish us as parents, grandparents, and caring adults to be cautious and intentional about what we allow our kids to play and watch online. I find YouTube particularly concerning, as even if a child starts out watching something innocent, the other options that pop up or ads can take your child where you, or they, didn't intend.

Thankfully, there are several good resources to help parents discern safe media options.

Plugged In Online, under the umbrella of Focus on the Family, is a great media resource for families and has been a go-to of mine for years.

They provide detailed, in-depth reviews of movies, music, TV shows, video games, and even popular YouTube Channels from a family-centered, Christian perspective. Common Sense Media is another similar resource, though from a secular perspective, that gives age-based reviews on popular media.

As your child engages in music, movies, or video games, I encourage you as parents to be vigilant and careful. Use parental locks where available. Sit down with your child and watch what they are watching, or ask to sit with them for a bit as they play their favorite video game. They may not be too thrilled about this, but that's okay!

Be especially discerning about allowing your child to have internet access in their room, whether on a cell phone or an Xbox, where they can engage with media behind closed doors. Consider the following questions: Do



you truly know everything your elementary child is being exposed to? What is involved in the games they play? Is what you see or hear acceptable to you as their parent?

As hard as we may try to shield our children, questionable issues will always pop up in one area or another. Take those moments to converse with your child about those topics. Point them back to what God has to say. Get them thinking about how to discern what is honoring and pleasing to God.

Matthew 6:22 says, "The eye is the lamp of the body. If your eyes are healthy, your whole body will be full of light." Let us test the media that both we and our children are consuming. Are we, as parents, modeling good choices? God has given us this wonderful opportunity to steward and lead our children. Let's be good examples of discernment and work to honor God in all we do.

The week is busy as the students learn about a new culture and interact with many new people

who soon become friends. It is a life-changing experience that will not soon be forgotten. Below,

the sixth graders share moments that stood out from their recent trip.

"One memory that stuck out to me was about my brother's sponsored student, José David, and his family. We went for a home visit, and they kindly welcomed us into



their home. His mom fed us these yummy things called tostadas. Even though they have so little, they give so much. In the next few days, his family brought us a delicious food called Mole, made of plantains, chocolate, and spices, and on the last day, they brought gifts for the whole group." – Lucy Moyer
