NORTH CAMPUS NOTES

Redemptive discipline is a significant part of a child's development at CHCS. We desire for students to move out of negative or unhealthy behaviors and into behaviors that demon-

strate a life being transformed by Christ. Our faculty work diligently to not just "correct" but help students understand what behavior choices honor God. Several steps happen continually in our school building to successfully achieve the goals of redemptive discipline.

We are genuinely in the process of building disciples — which means a continual transformation to become like Christ. Students are asked, "What did you do?" Being able to honestly state that you were unkind or made a poor choice is precisely what God wants from each of us. Just as God forgives us, we can forgive each other and move forward in His grace.

It is refreshing to affirm a child when they honestly state what they did was wrong or sinful. Our students are asked, "What should you have done?" This allows them to consider more appropriate behavior that shows respect for God's principles and their families and friends. As we work with our students to walk through these steps, the Holy Spirit works on their hearts to bring about permanent change.

Repentance means changing your mind and turning away from behaviors that could be harmful to yourself and others. Our students are encouraged to apologize appropriately. Being able to look another person in the eye and state that you are sorry that you wronged them is very freeing. It can restore relationships. This is precisely what God does for us with forgiveness. We confess our sins to Him, and He restores our relationship with Him. It is such a blessing to be part of the interaction of reconnecting children to one another. There is often relief in the face and voice of a child as reconciliation takes place. Accepting and acknowledging that we all have the potential for inappropriate actions and words can help bridge the gap when there is tension in a relationship. It is not unusual for the offended child to quickly say, "I forgive you," and provide a hug.

There can also be consequences in varying degrees for a student's choices. Often these are natural consequences. If there is a scuffle during a soccer game, being unable to play for the rest of the time is a good reminder to make better choices. As children mature, it is beneficial to discuss this step with them by asking, "What might help you not choose this behavior again?" We often make better choices when we are made uncomfortable, and this can be used as a reminder.

Our students benefit from our consistent model of redemptive discipline. Obedience to God's principles is paramount as our faculty model forgiveness and help students walk through this process. Self-control is a clear demonstration of the Fruit of the Spirit. Galatians 5:23 states, "Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the sinful nature with its passions and desires." We are humbled to be part of God's process of molding each of us into the likeness of Christ.

I love the word "youth" in 1 Timothy 4:12! I love

that God specifically addresses young people and has a specific purpose for them – **to be an example!** This year, we asked our sixth graders



to rise to the challenge of being examples in the form of servant leadership. We called it TEAM 4:12!

Our desire was to teach leadership skills and provide leadership opportunities by mirroring the experience of applying for a job. Sixthgrade students were encouraged to apply for a school-related "job," walking through the process of getting references, relating "experience," choosing a position, and sharing their abilities. They were then scheduled for a "job interview" with the Principal. They took these interviews seriously and came into them acting beyond their years. They were asked what character qualities they may have that would make them good leaders, how they have already shown servant leadership, and about their relationship with Jesus. This was a precious time of getting to know the heart of these students.

Leadership training came in the form of working through 1 Timothy 4:12 and laying out God's expectations for them as leaders, being an example in speech, conduct, love, faith, and purity! Then we were set to launch them into their jobs!



Our sixth graders stepped into many roles throughout our building and throughout the day – helping our Preschool and Pre-Kindergarten students as they came into the building in the morning, giving morning announcements, leading second-grade reading groups, shelving library books, stacking chairs in our Early Childhood classrooms, announcing car numbers during dismissal, participating in planning fun days, serving on the worship team, and leading a chapel.

TEAM 4:12 is an exciting way to see students beginning to understand and live out God's purpose for them! We pray that they make it their own and continue being servant leaders in the next season of their lives. "For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them." Ephesians 2:10

Readers are Leaders at CHCS -Lisa Meyer, Reading Specialist

When your child comes home from school, and you ask what he learned, does he say, "Nothing"? As a CHCS Reading Specialist, I am here to tell you otherwise! In this article, I will answer these questions: "How do CHCS students learn to read?" and "How do students at CHCS transition to reading to learn?"

Students come from a variety of backgrounds. Those from a home where they have been read to and in which language is a big part of everyday life have an advantage over students without these experiences. Science is revealing that reading is not hard-wired into our brains at birth. Unlike language acquisition, reading involves several steps, the first of which is recognizing the phonemes (individual sounds) within words. By mapping the brain reading process through MRI studies, research has shown that a structured literacy approach that helps students map letters to sounds is the most efficient way to teach reading.

CHCS students in Preschool and Pre-K learn phonemic awareness skills; that is, they learn to identify and manipulate individual sounds in words. These skills continue to be developed in Kindergarten, first grade, and second grade. Those who struggle with these skills will likely struggle to learn to read. Our Kindergarten and first-grade teachers use a phonemic awareness curriculum written by Michael Heggerty, Ed. D. that includes daily explicit and systematic phonological and phonemic awareness lessons. Explicit means the skills are directly taught (no guessing), and systematic means they follow a logical sequence from easiest to hardest skills.

Our K-2 teachers also use the Superkids Reading Curriculum which has proven effective as it is built on ideas the science of reading says are effective, including:

· Explicit, systematic phonics instruction beginning with direct instruction and moving to guided practice with decreasing support

- · Systematic, following a scope and sequence that grows in complexity and includes a cumulative review
- · Engaging and providing opportunities for incremental steps of success
- Early instruction is important because prevention is better than intervention
- · Instruction that is intensive, data-driven, and focused on essential skills

Recently, our South Campus first- and second-graders piloted an oral read-

ing fluency assessment. Overall, they did very well, scoring above the norms for the average student in their respective grades. This chart summarizes their performance:

When students get to third grade, the curriulum focuses on reading to learn. Our grade 3-6 students are engaged with a reading curriculum called Read Side by Side: CIA (Collect, Interpret, Apply). See readsidebyside.com for more information. The program engages students in reading a wide variety of books while making meaningful connections to characters and issues they face. As students read trade books, they build analytical, critical thinking, and synthesizing skills. Instruction is differentiated by matching readers to books at their reading level. Students also enjoy listening to good literature, as read-aloud books are a part of the curriculum in each grade. This enables students to read more challenging texts when they have already been exposed to the read-aloud book's genre, topic, and theme.

Based on the Star Reading Test Scores, most CHCS classes perform well above average.



The following chart shows how our students are soaring in reading:

*Grade Equivalent scores represent how students' test scores compare with his or her peers nationwide. (For example, our first graders tested at GE 2.6. This does not necessarily mean they can do classwork at the 2.6 grade level. It only indicates that their reading skills are well above average for their grade level.)

**Median Percentile Rank indicates the percentage of students in the norm group who obtained lower scores. (For example, our first graders' reading skills are better than 82.3% of *first-grade students nationwide.*)

As you can see, Chapel Hill Christian School students perform very well in reading. Students, we are proud of your hard work and accomplishments! Have a great summer, and keep reading!

SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES ARE GROWING AT CHCS

The opportunity to give your child a dedicated and rewarding Christian education is more attainable now due to recent updates to the *EdChoice Scholarship Program*. Families at higher income levels may now qualify for assistance.

As of May 2023, the Ohio Department of Education has released its new Scholarship Income Verification System, allowing families to enter and submit their income information electronically to the Scholarship Office for verification of low-income status. Parents can enter household member and

income information and upload supporting income documents directly into the online system. Simply scan the QR code to access the verification portal guide.

FAMILY MATTERS Summer SPAM Goals - Ingrid Monteith, North Counselor



Yay! You made it to summer vacation! What are your plans during your summer break? This is one of my favorite questions to ask kids. I love to hear about vacation plans, summer camp, and plans to visit family who live far away. Having lots of time to relax, recharge and have fun is wonderful!

One way to make the most of your summer is to set goals for what you'd like to do. I know setting goals can be boring and tedious; however, selecting the right goals can help you have the best summer ever. Goals

that are **Specific, Positive, Achievable, and Measurable** can set you up for success; that's why I call them SPAM goals. Let's take the goal, "I want to have fun with my kids this summer," and make it a SPAM goal.

It is often helpful to start with the **Positive** part of the goal. Positive goals talk about what you are going to do instead of what you are not going to do. For example, instead of "I want our family to spend less time on their screens this summer," you could say, "I want our family to spend more time together outside." Now we have to make it **Specific** because just being outside together is too vague. It would be easy to get to the end of summer and realize you didn't play outside together very much at all. A specific "outside goal" could be "I want our family to visit different parks with awesome playgrounds." This is a good goal because it is also **Achievable**. Visiting parks with awesome playgrounds is something you can do! A goal that is not achievable would sound like, "Our family will do something fun outside every day." Expecting your family to go outside every day of the summer is unrealistic and, therefore, not achievable.

A goal is **Measurable** when it is something you can keep track of or check off. Your goal can be, "This summer, our family will visit five different parks that have awesome playgrounds." This way, you can keep track of and make a list of the parks you will visit.

Do you see the difference between these two goals? The first, "I want to have fun with my kids this summer," is good! The second, however, "This summer, our family will spend time together outside by visiting five different parks with awesome playgrounds," is great and a SPAM goal.

In my experience with setting goals, I am much more likely to succeed if I make sure it's a SPAM goal. Summer is a wonderful time to reconnect with our families after a busy school year. I wish you all great times together in whatever you choose to do! Get together and set some goals for your family and try to have fun making them SPAM goals.
